NEW BOATING CLUB TO SET SAIL



Construction has begun of a new boating and sailing club at Southmere Lake, which is scheduled to open later this year.

When finished the club will be managed by YMCA Thames Gateway, who already run the café and the nursery at the nearby Lakeside Centre. They will deliver a varied programme of activities including sailing, kayaking and canoeing, mainly for local schools and other young people in the area.

The outside of the boating club will be covered in a perforated metal

material to reflect the lake and park, while the gardens surrounding it will be landscaped to blend into the local parkland.

The new boating and sailing club will complement the £2.5m that Peabody has already invested in Southmere Lake, improving the water quality, and creating a new wildlife habitat.

In addition to the boating club,
Peabody is now working on a
detailed planning application for a
new lakefront development next to
Cygnet Square, on the former Binsey
Walk site. You can read more about it

CLICK TO FIX

Peabody has launched a new online service so residents can easily report any problems on streets and open spaces – such as fly-tipping, pest control and faulty public lighting.

Using FixMyStreet residents can now photograph, locate and highlight an issue using their mobile phone. All reports go to Peabody's environmental services team in Thamesmead, who will log the job and confirm when the problem has been resolved.

This is all part of Peabody's plan to improve the day-to-day experiences of residents and ensure Thamesmean is a place that people are proud to call home.

TACO'S DAY OF ACTION

In June, local arts organisation
TACO! and artist Holly Graham
hosted A DAY OF ACTION!, a daylong exploration of the Thamesmead
community's anti-racist and activism
work in the early 1990s.

More than 40 people, including local councillors, attended the event to conclude the first part of ACTION!, a project led by Holly, delivered by TACO!, and funded by the Black Culture Collective, Peabody and the Royal Borough of Greenwich.

The project aims to address the gap in storytelling about anti-racism in Thamesmead.

Speakers included activist Dev Barrah from Greenwich Action Committee Against Racist Attacks, Giles Gabon, Director of the Greenwich Inclusion Project, and Councillor Ann-Marie Cousins, talking about the Woolwich Simba Project.

The day ended with an open discussion, including local residents, about race, cultural relations and community organising in Southeast London, and how to remember what the people of Thamesmead achieved in fighting racism.

Holly and TACO! are still collecting material for the project and are asking for people to feed into the archive by donating items, contributing to the reading list, and sharing short oral histories.

LOCAL ARTIST BEGINS WORK ATTHE CAGE



A former Thamesmead resident has won a £12,000 art commission to transform the iconic Cage basketball court in South Thamesmead.

Contemporary artist Joseph Ijoyemi's artwork, Believe and Achieve, is being created to promote confidence, hope and unity within The Cage, the multi-use games area underneath The Green Chain Walk.

It will feature vibrant colours and silhouettes of local people playing games, which Joseph will capture through workshops he's been running there. His final art piece will be painted in autumn 2022 and unveiled in Spring 2023.


Joseph's design was chosen by The Cage TM group, made up of local residents, who have been leading the commissioning process since 2019. Having shortlisted six artists from more than 30 applications, the group engaged young people and others in the community to choose their favourite artwork.

Joseph said: "I was raised in Thamesmead, so The Cage has huge sentimental value to me. I often met up with friends there to play basketball and football. Many of my memories stem from time spent at The Cage, some good, some not so good. "For me, by making the space brighter it means your future is bright. It means that you're able to achieve whatever you desire. And that's what I want to achieve in this space. As a contemporary artist working in a collaborative way is key for me and to work with the community is precious."

Dominika Kieruzel, one of the local residents who judged the commission entries, added: "When Joseph came to our first site visit at The Cage he told us that his vision was for it to be really colourful and joyful. He has experience with mentoring kids and I love that he wants to engage with lots of young people for the design as well as the actual painting part of the installation."

The installation of Joseph's artwork will be carried out as part of a wider refurbishment of the space being delivered by muf architecture/art. This will include new sporting equipment, lighting, and seating – making it a vibrant, accessible, and welcoming place for people to enjoy.

In June residents from across Thamesmead headed to Cygnet Square in Southmere to celebrate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee.

More than 400 local people enjoyed a fun-packed evening of entertainment, including live music, face-painting and street theatre.

As the sun went down, Cllr Teresa O'Neill, Leader of Bexley Council, lit a commemorative jubilee community beacon, delighting residents and other onlookers including Abena Oppong-Asare MP and local ward councillors Zainab Asunramu, Olu Babatola and Lade Hephzibah Olugbemi.

The flame burned brightly outside The Nest, the state-of-the-art community building and library, which was bathed in red, white and blue lights specially for the occasion.

The event was organised by Three Rivers, Peabody and the London Borough of Bexley.

Dear Residents of Thamesmead, Allow me to introduce myself. My name is Libris Borowicz and I am the Head Guardian of the Library of Everything.

If you haven't visited us before, the Library of Everything is a mystical travelling compendium that has been around for as long as people have been writing down stories and facts on paper and creating books.

Over many years the library has grown in size. From a humble bag to a horse and cart, to a caravan, to an armada of vehicles, all pieced and patched together.

There are now 314 floors, 28 sub-sections and 78 spiral side departments. From 1 to 1001 departments, covering every discipline imaginable; from horticulture to horology to hairstyling, from cars to cardigan construction to canines, from meteorology to medicine to magic and

Fair to say, the library is a marvel to behold and myself and the other library Guardians count ourselves lucky to work within the collection.

We travel all over the world collecting stories from both well-known authors and those ordinary folk who stumble across our hidden doorways.

The library often travels to places filled with curiosity. Only those with brilliant imaginations are invited into the library so we often land in primary schools! If visitors then write a story for our permanent collection, they become permanent members.

We have travelled all over. Just recently we journeyed from Australia to Argentina, then from Egypt to the United Kingdom and we're currently in South Africa! There are some places that we may visit many times, especially when it appears the surroundings are rich with imaginative storytellers. Thamesmead is one of these such places.

Recently we found ourselves back in Thamesmead within the halls of the wonderful Heronsgate School. Having visited Linton Mead and Hawksmoor in the past, we knew that we were bound to be in a place brimming with brilliant writers!

We were not wrong. Fellow Library Guardians, Gillian and Avery, sent me regular communications to update me on the fantastic visitors to the library. We are so impressed by the quality of story writers that you have in Thamesmead we are in initial conversations to set-up a Department of Tales from Thamesmead in the library. We definitely have enough to fill many bookshelves!

I wanted to say a massive thank you to the children of Thamesmead for all of the wonderful stories that you have contributed to the Library of Everything so far.

As Head Guardian of the library I often get sent new stories to read and I must say that yours have been some of the most astounding I have encountered.

Brilliant plot twists and creative characters have kept me on the edge of my seat, reading into the early hours. It is an honour to have you all as authorised permanent members of the library and it is so exciting that you are now published authors within our many departments!

On behalf of all the Library Guardians we look forward to reading any future stories you may send us and we hope we may get to visit Thamesmead again one day. Please do keep on reading and writing. It is clear you have the most majestic of imaginations!

Thamesmead Festival, the town's annual celebration of its rich and diverse cultural life, is back this summer, bigger and better than ever before.

On Saturday 20 August, from 12pm to 7pm at Southmere Park, Thamesmead residents will be able to enjoy a programme packed full of home-grown talent, featuring live music, dance, performance, food and activities, as well as the much-anticipated annual dog show.

This year's event will see the return of its three main stages – the Park Stage, up on the hill; the Southmere Stage on Southmere Square and the more informal Unplugged Stage, among the trees in Southmere Park – showcasing music, spoken word, dance, magic and comedy.

The festival will welcome back
Thamesmead-based street dance
group Dynamix for a special
performance and Greenwich Dance,

who recently relocated to The Nest community building, for their debut appearance.

A spectacular 25m high hot air balloon, tapestried with stories from Thamesmead, will be inflated and tethered on the festival site. Fields of EveryWhen is a collaborative artwork by artists Neil Musson and Jono Retallick and the Thamesmead community.

The festival will also feature community stalls run by local groups and charities, providing information about their work in the community, free workshops and activities for children and adults, and a mouth-watering menu of food and drink from across the world.

The entire festival is programmed and led by the Festival Production Group, a committee of 14 residents, representing Thamesmead's diverse cultures and neighbourhoods. They're working with acclaimed cultural event producers, Serious, who ran last year's fantastic event.

Deborah Frimpong, a Festival
Production Group member and Chair of
the Moorings Neighbourhood Forum,
said: "What an opportunity to see
Thamesmead recognised for all the
good things that are happening here.

"The festival is a unique and special showcase that not only brings the four areas of Thamesmead together but also draws in the wider community. I'm really looking forward to an exceptional time celebrating, sharing, and basking in the company of friends, family and local talents."

Adriana Marques, Peabody's Head of Thamesmead Cultural Strategy, added: "The festival is community leadership at its best - a fantastic day of music, arts, community groups and markets that reflect Thamesmead's unique spirit. It is an annual moment to celebrate this wonderful town and invite visitors to witness it in all its vibrant glory."

20 THINGS TO DO IN THAMESMEAD IN THE SUMMER

Summer is a very special time of the year in Thamesmead, with the town's green spaces, lakes and canals to explore in all their glory.

The Making Space for Nature team has put together this list of 20 things that will get you up close to all the great things nature has to offer in your neighbourhood. You may even discover a few places you've never seen before!

Use sticks and leaves to make your own natural self portrait

Visit your local park and try to spot:

- 2 A bee landing on a flower
- 3 A bird flying above in the sky
- A squirrel climbing in the trees
- Make a picnic and go and eat somewhere with a beautiful view
- Find a quiet spot and listen to the birds calling for each other, can you see a nest?
- Pile up some sticks, leaves and stones in a shady spot to create your own mini bug
- 8 Spot two butterflies flapping their wings

and flying together

- Make a map of your local park and use it to organise your own treasure hunt
- Go on a walk and collect three small things that will remind you of your journey

- Visit one of the public community gardens in Thamesmead guess what vegetables are growing
- Make a frame with your hands or some paper – can you frame a scene with:
- 12 Flowers growing
- 13 Trees swaying in the breeze
- Birds landing on a lake or canal
- Children playing in a park
- Visit a place in Thamesmead that you have never been to before
- Find a leaf that is the same size as your hand
- Feed the ducks a healthy snack. They like eating bird seed, peas or chopped lettuce!
- Draw or paint a picture of your favourite place in Thamesmead
- Take a walk on a rainy day, look for puddles and animals hiding in woods so they don't get wet!



FIELDS OF EVERYWHEN

Over the last two years artists Neil Musson and Jono Retallick have worked closely with the local community, collecting stories about the people and places of Thamesmead.

These stories have been transformed into 225 embroideries, textile collages and illustrations, and digitally enlarged onto hot air balloon fabric. They will now form a 'floating gallery' celebrating Thamesmead's rich history, its diverse community, and its creative talent.

The balloon will be taking to the skies in Southmere Park, Birchmere Park, Crossways and Gallions Reach Park over the summer.

groups of six or fewer will be able to compete against each other on a Community Leaderboard.

Points are earned by scanning virtual tags around the borough, converting your number of steps into Street Tag points. Top teams will win fantastic prizes for themselves or their school.

WE'RE MAKING SPACE FOR NATURE



The Making Space for Nature programme was set up three years ago by Peabody, together with Groundwork London and the Mayor of London, as part of the CLEVER Cities initiative, to work in partnership with the local Thamesmead community.

It aims to introduce new ways for the people of Thamesmead to use and enjoy our many beautiful green spaces and help the town's wildlife to thrive and develop.

Since its creation the programme has been doing just that through a whole host of projects. You may have seen some of the group's work without even realising.

From having a resident gardener to help people make the most of their own green spaces, to planting Thamesmead's Tiny Forest, the Making Space for Nature team is always looking for new ways to make a difference.

Recently, the team has partnered with the North West Kent Countryside Partnership to host a series of free 'Wildlife & Welly Walks' for three Thamesmead schools. This sees classes of children getting out and about to learn about local wildlife. They also work together to improve the green spaces in the area so other pupils can really enjoy their walk to school.

There's also the Making Space for Nature Community Fund that gives successful applicants between £200 to £2,000 to make their own naturebased projects come to life.

Jack Gower (pictured above), Peabody's Landscape Activation Manager, who oversees Making Space for Nature for Peabody said: "Thamesmead is such a unique place when it comes to green places and wildlife.

"The whole point of this programme is to work with the local community to create projects that really mean something to them; projects that will have a big impact on people's lives and the place they call home.

"It's the many local volunteers who are so passionate about Thamesmead who ensure Making Space for Nature is such a success. We're very thankful to them for choosing to spend time working with us."

There are a number of ways you can get involved in Making Space for Nature including joining the Nature Forum, which meets every month to discuss new ideas. You can also volunteer at the drop-in gardening sessions or take part in the biodiversity action volunteer programme.

If you're a local school or community group why not explore the Tump 53 Nature Reserve Education Programme? This includes open days and seasonal events covering activities such as mini beast hunting, pond dipping and orienteering.

GREEN DREAMS ARE MADE BY THIS



The Making Space for Nature (MSFN) Community Fund was established to develop new ideas that help make Thamesmead greener.

It awards grants from £200 up to £2,000 to individuals and organisations to deliver nature-based projects that benefit local residents. The Fund is a key component of the MSFN programme which was set up by Peabody, together with Groundwork London and the Mayor of London, as part of the CLEVER Cities initiative. Here are two programmes that have recently benefitted from the Fund.

Natural Gardening Workshops

Miyuki Kashara has created and hosted 'An Introduction to Natural Gardening and Soil Ecology', a series of outdoor practical workshops for local people.

Miyuki developed her workshops after suffering an allergic reaction to something she'd eaten. To find out why this had happened she focused on the relationship between soil and food, concluding "healthy soil provides healthy food."

Last year, Miyuki successfully applied to the MSFN Community Fund so that she could share her knowledge with others.

This has enabled Miyuki to educate, entertain and inspire Thamesmead residents on a really important topic. She said of the Fund: "If you think your project will benefit the local community, just try it!"

Edible Garden Project

The Atrium Community Centre is a place for residents to come together in South Thamesmead. It hosts a variety of workshops and fitness classes. At the heart of it is a garden for the whole community to enjoy.

The team there wanted to engage the community in planting and to partner with other individuals and organisations who have benefitted from MSFN grants. Their plan was to create an Edible Garden to provide locally grown produce, such as tomatoes and radishes, to support Ozge Aden (who was awarded an MSFN grant last year) with her healthy eating and seed growing workshops.

Local resident Kim Teasdale met with Groundwork London – part of the Making Space for Nature team – to discuss plans for the centre, and how a grant from the MSFN Community Fund could help transform the space.

Kim successfully applied for a grant and is now running the Atrium and Edible Garden project along with other local members of the Thamesmead Community Benefit Society (TCBS).

They've been busy installing composting bins and a light sculpture (made by local artist, Nathalie Coste), tidying up the Edible Garden and have now added a polytunnel to boost their growing options all year round.

The team isn't showing signs of slowing down. Kim says, "We want more sculptures and more planters made from pallets." And they have plans for more things for the community to look forward to, including mural festivals.

The MSFN Community Fund is now closed for this year but it's never too early to start thinking about your idea for 2023. Find out more at the 'In Your Community' section of www.thamesmeadnow.org.uk

Earlier this year Peabody worked with local organisations, including Smiley Ark and the Jesse's Place Foundation, to support a host of holiday food and fun activities.


Funded by the Department for Education, these programmes help children and families access free physical activities, and healthy meals, while promoting play and social interaction during the school holidays.

More than 50 young people recently took part in a ten-week boxing programme with Parent Power and Power Mobile Gym.

Peabody commissioned both organisations to put on the free combined activity for young people at Hawksmoor youth hub after they had expressed an interest in taking part.

The boxing sessions were led by coach Shan and coach Riley who is a Peabody resident.

Young people were taught boxing and fitness and the sessions helped to improve confidence and self-esteem.

One 15-year-old participant said: "These boxing sessions have allowed me to make friends with people who I would have never thought of." Another

youngster, 13, added: "The sessions have been a really cool experience, and I feel as though not only have I learnt a lot about life skills but also learnt a lot about myself!"

As well as the boxing activity, Parent Power worked alongside Power Mobile Gym to provide a space to promote positive mental health and well-being. Young people could pop in and take part in various activities such as creative therapy, talking and reflection.

"It was really good to talk about my emotions, it helped me to walk away from situations.

I understand my mental health and why it is important to have better relationships with myself and others. I was glad to be with my friends and to be able to talk in the group when I am feeling stressed," said one of the teenagers.



NEXT STEPS FOR SOUTH THAMESMEAD

Peabody is finalising a planning application for a new development alongside Southmere Lake.

The development, on the former Binsey Walk site, will feature 329 new homes. Some 42% will be affordable housing (a mix of social rent, London Affordable Rent and shared ownership), ranging from one-bedroom apartments to larger family homes. Many will have views over Southmere Lake.

Peabody recently held public consultation events online and at The Nest in Southmere. These were an opportunity for local people to learn more about the project, meet the design

team, and tell Peabody more about what they would like to see on the lakefront location.
