Painting the town

Thamesmead has been enjoying an explosion of creativity and colour over the past few months, with the creation of a new series of murals.

Artists Nadina Ali, duo Daisy Allen and Ellen Camilla Rose, Paige Denham, Lours, creative collective Trapped in Zone One (lead artist Alex Cullen) and Jeru Nomi were co commissioned by Peabody and the Street Art Group, a collective consisting of residents, artists and industry experts.

Their eye-catching works form part of the Thamesmead Street Art Trail, building on the eight permanent murals created for the town's underpasses in 2020.

Artist Nadina Ali, who has created her dazzling design at the back of the Kale Road garages along Yarnton Way, said: "I'm really excited to have been commissioned to create a mural for the Thamesmead street art project. I now live locally so it's a great way for me to give back to the community through my art.

"Thamesmead is changing, and my artwork is about encouraging all people living in the area – regardless of who they are, where they're from and what they believe in – to imagine the future they want to see in Thamesmead.

"I also wanted to add some wellneeded colour to the road where the mural is located by creating a really colourful and welcoming artwork that can have an uplifting impact for passers-by. I hope the positive message of my artwork will inspire people to take ownership of what Thamesmead will look like in the upcoming years whilst brightening up the area."

- · Support communities to be happier, healthier and wealthier



This year saw the introduction of the Wanderlust Hill Stage, showcasing Thamesmead's young stars of tomorrow. It joined the usual crowd favourites – the Park, Southmere and Unplugged Stages – all funded by Peabody and Arts Council England.

The stage was programmed and coproduced by local youth collective The South East Way, eleven 14–16-year-olds, brought together by community arts organisation, Three Rivers.

The festival also saw the launch of a project commissioned by Thamesmead's Black Culture Collective, Our Story Our Song.
This eight-week music programme is giving 15 young people the opportunity to write, record and perform original songs and create a music video.

Highlights on the Park Stage included South London's uplifting House Gospel Choir, retrostyle soul and rock n roll from Logan J Parker, and the return of festival favourite and local star J Cocoa with her sweet mix of jazz, soul and RnB.

Meanwhile on the chilled Unplugged Stage, crowds enjoyed the poetry of Sam Castell-Ward; South London singer, rapper and The Voice contestant Redrum; and were swept away by Midori Jaeger's mix of indie vocals and cello. The Southmere Stage was the place to witness Thamesmead's best dance moves

with hip hop from Afrobeat, and street dance from Dynamix; competitive cheerleading from Utopia Cheer; and Thamesmead-born TikTok dance sensation Dancer Ras.

Meanwhile the ever-popular Dog Show saw Thamesmead's most talented and cheeky pooches being put through their paces.

Stalls run by local groups and charities were a great attraction for those wanting to buy handmade goods, or enjoy free workshops and activities at The Play Zone. All fuelled with a globe-trotting mix of delicious locally produced food and drink.

Once again, the free, family-friendly showcase of local talent and creativity was co-produced by the Festival Production Group, consisting of 10 Thamesmead residents, in partnership with event producers Serious.

Festival Production Group member, Julia Hien, said: "I had a fantastic time at this year's festival and I'm sure many others did too!

"The new Wanderlust Hill stage was probably my favourite. It was amazing to see the hard work that the young producers put into it come to life and their energy, enthusiasm and encouragement for all the acts on that stage. It really made the experience even more enjoyable and electric."













Southmere resident, Ting Yu, said:

"I couldn't be more excited. My Maltese dog, Moka, came third in the best trick category in the dog show and I've been enjoying some great local food.

"It's my first time at the festival and I can't believe how much there is going on. I've seen some great music, especially the rap, and I'll be coming back next year and bringing all my friends with me."





Local MP, Abena Oppong-Asare, said:

"It's great to have a free event like this in Thamesmead offering such a diverse programme that caters for everyone, and all age groups. There's lots of happy faces and I've been speaking to so many people.

"It's brilliant to see the festival getting bigger and bigger every year. I'm sure having the Elizabeth Line at Abbey Wood and the great word of mouth the festival gets has attracted people from outside the area. We hope there'll be even more people coming along in the future as transport links improve even more."

Dad, Darryl Fellows said:

"The whole festival is so familyfriendly, there are three generations of us down here, our three kids and grandparents. There's something for all of us to enjoy.

"It's 100% for the community and it's been great catching up with old friends while we're here listening to the music and watching the dance acts."




Be a sport

My Thamesmead

Paige Denham, local artist



Paige has recently completed her latest Thamesmead mural in Southmere (see story on page 3) having previously won a competition to bring one of her designs to life at a canal underpass in the town. You can find out more about her work at www.paigedenham.com. Here Paige shares what she loves most about Thamesmead.

How long have you lived in Thamesmead? I've lived in Thamesmead for 27 years now, all my life. My grandparents moved to the area when it was first built and they had the opportunity to buy their first home, my Nan is still in the same house. Then, my mum grew up here and now I'm the third generation.

Where do you live in Thamesmead?

I live in the Crossways area of Thamesmead.

What's the best thing about Thamesmead?
For me there are a few great things about living here. I'm really grateful for the creative community that is here and has been grown through the support of Peabody and Bow Arts.

We have so much creative talent in the local area and that's really special. Then there is the landscape. I love the contrast between our luscious green spaces and harsh concrete. That's been an inspiration for me throughout my

Where's your favourite place to walk?
Crossway Park backs onto my Nan's house and it has been the backdrop to so many nice family memories. My brother and I would spend every summer holiday in the park playing on the long metal slide or attempting to play tennis.

What's your favourite fact about Thamesmead?

In 2016 Selfridges created a short film by Southmere Lake. In 2019 I photographed my graduate collection in the same space with the tower blocks as a background.

Where's your favourite place to eat and drink? I'm really enjoying more places to eat and drink opening up around the local area.

What's your favourite Thamesmead memory? I can't really isolate and choose one memory, that's really hard as I've lived 27 happy years here with my family. But, one moment that sticks in my mind is when I finished my first mural — neon tower blocks on Claridge Way under Woodpecker Road — and I took my family to see what I'd been up to.

I'd kept it a surprise from my Nan that I was painting it and it was so nice to see the joy on her face when she realised it was my artwork on the wall.

What's the best kept secret?

I think Thamesmead as a whole is the best kept secret. It's a special little corner of London that's unlike any other. It has architecture, parks, lakes, creative hub and community spirit. It's a unique place.

Community Champions

Community Champions are volunteers who work with the Royal Borough of Greenwich and London Borough of Bexley.

They share key information with friends, family and community networks about health and well-being issues, local activities and support. The initiative began as a partnership between the councils and the NHS toshare information about COVID-19.

Resident and volunteer, Carla Ramos, tells us about being a Community Champion:

How did you find out about the volunteering role?

Through Divine Buzz; a local community group I am part of which supports residents with physical, social and educational activities.

What do you do in your role?

I share information with people, either by email or in person. I direct them to places where they can get support such as medical clinics, GP surgeries or mental health charities.

What do you enjoy about it?

I like helping people. You can give as much or as little time as you can spare each week. It all makes a difference.

Why would you encourage others to get involved?

You can help other people to help themselves, meet new people, share things and have new experiences.

Celebrating black culture



Three community projects celebrating Black culture in Thamesmead have received £30,000 in funding thanks to the Black Culture Collective's (BCC's) creative commission for 2023.

They are the Youth Artist Development
Programme 'Our Story Our Song', The Black
Excellence Pop-up Fest and Dad's Space:
Bred in Thamesmead.

Thamesmead Youth Artist Development
Programme is an immersive music
production and artist development
programme open to musicians, singers and
rappers from Thamesmead aged 12-18. The
programme begins on 23 September and
will conclude with a live music performance
and music video screening at The Moorings
Sociable Club. It's being delivered by
Everyone's A Singer CIC in collaboration with
The Collective Makers.

The Black Excellence Pop-up Fest is a series of four pop-up festivals which will give emerging entrepreneurs and new Black businesses the opportunity to showcase their services and sell their products.

The first event takes place at the Nest on Saturday 7 October from 12pm – 5pm. It's being run by Hazel Chawapiwa of 2inspire Academy CIC, Tricia Blake of Diva Choice and Natalie Royer of NLPR Agency.

Dad's Space: Bred in Thamesmead is a curated event offering support for dads and dads-to-be alongside wider activities for the local community.

Carmel Britto, chair of the Black Culture
Collective, said: "This year we were proud to
commission three projects which collectively
embody exactly what the BCC stands for.
Projects that will engage and excite the local
community whilst celebrating African and
Caribbean arts, heritage and culture."

The BCC was launched with support from Peabody in 2020 to recognise the critical role Thamesmead's Black community has had in shaping the cultural, social and economic life of the town

It is made up of residents who want to create a bridge between individuals, community groups and organisations.

Peabody's Neighbourhoods Team provide a wide range of support and activities – from repairs, estate maintenance and dealing with anti-social behaviour to helping with rehousing and settling residents into new homes.

To ensure the team give you the best service it can, some changes are being made to the way they work and how you can contact the department.

Going forward you will see:

More ways to get in touch

One of the team's key priorities in Thamesmead is making it easier for residents to get in touch. By doing this, the team can address your concerns more efficiently and effectively.

You can already contact the team by phoning the customer hub (0300 123 3456), going to the website (www.peabody.org.uk/contact-us/) or booking a face-to-face appointment at home.

Team members will be more visible in local communities and regularly out in their neighbourhoods so they can develop closer links with local people.

The department has also started holding resident surgeries where you can meet Peabody staff to raise any issues you might be experiencing.

At the surgeries all Peabody teams who work in Thamesmead are in the room together, meaning residents who have problems, or any questions, can immediately speak to the right person to get things done.

As Pablo Cazar, Assistant Director for Resident Services for Peabody in Thamesmead, explains:

"Resident surgeries are proving very popular.
All the teams are there together so residents
can speak face to face with someone, whether
it's raising a concern about something going
on in their area or an issue with a repair."

The next resident surgery will be at The Nest Community Building and Library in Southmere on Tuesday 24 October between 12pm to 3pm and 5pm to 7pm.

There will also be local surgeries rolled out across Thamesmead throughout the year.

More neighbourhood roles

Peabody is introducing more local managers as part of a plan to bring the team and residents closer together. The team members will be working in the local area every day.

This means each team member will have smaller areas to look after so they can spend more time getting to know each neighbourhood and the local community. This will help them to better understand and respond to any issues people raise.

Community Safety Specialists are also being introduced to tackle issues such as anti-social behaviour, domestic abuse and knife crime.

Ken Andrew, Peabody's Community Safety Manager in Thamesmead, outlines why this new approach is being introduced.

He said: "We appreciate the impact anti-social behaviour has on residents and their quality of life. This new team will liaise with other organisations such as local authorities, police and mental health support services to tackle it.

"The team consists of highly-trained and experienced officers who will provide a professional service to residents. They'll be visible in the community, so residents know exactly who to talk to."

Wells Chomutare is Peabody's Managing Director for South London and oversees the team in Thamesmead. He explains why this new approach is being taken.

Wells said: "We need to make sure that we deliver services that residents really want and that we are trusted and valued by them.

"Having reviewed how we work; we want to develop a closer relationship with residents so we can deliver a more effective service.

"We can only do this by working together with residents, who can highlight local issues and concerns so we can address them. Being better connected also enables us to be aware when any opportunities come up that can help create better communities.

"It will also be easier for residents to make appointments and meet team members. We want residents to have a wider choice of how they connect with us."

This new more visible community-based approach is best summed up by Wells: "You will know who your local team are and who to contact.

"We'll work in partnership with you and our team will be key members of the community

Repair days

We are also holding repair days where a particular block or neighbourhood will be the focus of an intense day of activity to tackle small repair jobs.

Residents can book a 30-minute slot and a multi-skilled trades person will visit you to fix that dripping tap or creaking door.

Pablo: "This is a great way of dealing with those niggling repair jobs in a quick and efficient manner.

"It also means we can meet and engage residents who we perhaps wouldn't normally get the opportunity to speak to because they don't get out and about or know how to contact us."

Lettings management

The Neighbourhoods Team works with residents who want to move between Peabody homes in Thamesmead.

You may need a smaller or larger home because of changed circumstances.
Or you might need a home on the ground floor because of mobility issues. If so, the team can help.

Sharon Leader, Allocations and Lettings Manager for Peabody in Thamesmead, leads the team responsible for letting properties and rehousing residents.

"There's a great sense of community in Thamesmead and on the whole if people's needs change, they want to stay in the area rather than move outside it," said Sharon.

One way of doing this is through the mutual exchange scheme. It's a free to use service where Peabody residents in Thamesmead can connect with others looking to swap their home for another that better suits their needs.

Sharon added: "We'll always do everything we can to help people get into the most suitable home for them."

One of the best things about living in Thamesmead are the many parks and green areas to enjoy.

North West Kent Countryside Partnership runs an initiative on behalf of Peabody that brings volunteers together to enhance the town's landscape.

There are some exciting changes coming to the Ridgeway as part of a long-term plan to boost wildlife there.

Thames Water has received funding to improve and enhance biodiversity between White Hart Lane in Greenwich and Eastern Way in Bexley, by creating five hectares of new habitat over the next five years.

It will be doing this by removing denser areas of scrub and non-native species, while restoring and extending the areas of more open habitats such as grassland, wildflowers and bare ground. It's been shown that in London this approach is the best way to increase the numbers of insects such as the dingy skipper butterfly, shrill carder bee and other rare species.

Claudia Innes, Community Projects Lead at Thames Water, said: "We are delighted to be working on a project that will bring such positive change to the Ridgeway.

"The new habitats created here over the next five years will provide a home for many more species and will be a vital link to other habitat improvement work underway in Thamesmead."

The project will be undertaken in two phases over the next five years. It has been funded through a biodiversity offsetting agreement with Cory Riverside Energy.

Mussel building

Peabody is working in partnership with environmental charity Thames21 which is launching a new scheme to improve the water quality in Gallions Lake and create exciting new features in the surrounding area.

A new wetland system will be installed in the lake. This will help to improve the water quality, manage the silt that spills into the lake, and create new habitats for wildlife.

Floating islands are also being put into position which will house mussels to act as a natural water pollution filter. A wildflower meadow will also be planted nearby in the park. This is all part of a wider project to improve and maintain the local waterways.
