

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More homes for South Thamesmead

Another important step has been taken to bring even more affordable homes to South Thamesmead.

The London Borough of Bexley's planning committee recently agreed to Peabody's initial plans for up to 1,950 new homes, of which at least 35% will be affordable, on the site of the old Lesnes estate, close to the new Abbey Wood Elizabeth Line station.

The proposals, which represent phases three to seven of Peabody's wider masterplan for South Thamesmead, also include new commercial areas and enhancements to the public open space.

Phase one includes 534 new homes close to Southmere Lake (55% of which will be affordable homes). It also includes the new Cygnet Square, the Nest library and community building, along with space for shops, services and places to eat and drink. This phase is due to complete by the end of this year.

Phase two will bring a further 329 new homes (42% will be affordable homes) to the area. Peabody submitted a detailed planning application for this phase to Bexley Council earlier in 2022, with a view to starting the project in 2023, subject to planning approval.

Matthew Foulis, Project Director Thamesmead for Peabody, said: "Bexley Council's decision takes us yet another step closer to improving the quality of life for residents in South Thamesmead.

"As well as benefiting from new, high quality, energy-efficient homes close to the Elizabeth Line, residents can also look forward to new facilities and more attractive, welcoming and accessible open spaces on their doorstep."

Cllr Teresa O'Neill OBE, Leader of the London Borough of Bexley, added: "The area has received a real boost with the start of services on the Elizabeth Line and we feel sure that the prospect of large numbers of new homes, commercial space and community facilities will be welcomed by existing and new residents.".

People from across Thamesmead turned out in force to celebrate its vibrant creative community at the annual Thamesmead Festival — with performers ranging from international stars to local legends. Residents and visitors flooded to Southmere Park on a sunny August day to enjoy a packed programme featuring homegrown talent, with live music, dance, performance, food and family activities.

The Park Stage was compered by charismatic host Fusion and enjoyed views of the 'Fields of EveryWhen' hot air balloon. Highlights from the stage included local street dance group Dynamix and rapper/ singer Jules.

Ahead of his Park Stage set, internationally acclaimed trumpeter Byron Wallen captivated the audience at the Unplugged Stage. His set included a collection of seashells as well as conches, and using a loop pedal to create a hypnotic soundscape.

The day culminated with a funpacked performance by Britain's Got Talent champions Twist and Pulse who got the audience cheering to their unique dance routines performed to a montaged soundtrack of RnB, pop music, TV theme tunes and mobile ringtones. The Dog Show, a festival favourite, was hosted by the sharply-attired Bunty and Bob, who invited festival-goers to enter their canine companions of all shapes and sizes into a series of categories including 'best treat catchers' and 'dog most resembling its owner'.

Throughout the afternoon, visitors were also able to wander between the stages browsing community stalls run by local groups and charities and sample the mouthwatering menu of locallyproduced global cuisine and drink.

The Festival is organised by the Festival Production Group, made up of 14 Thamesmead residents, in collaboration with live event producers Serious and Peabody's Culture Team.

Leaders united in improving transport links



In 2019 Peabody joined with Lendlease to masterplan a new town centre for Thamesmead the Thamesmead Waterfront.

A big part of these plans is an extension of the Docklands Light Railway which will improve transport connections to this part of Thamesmead. There's already been a noticeable difference with the Elizabeth Line opening at Abbey Wood.

In the summer, Cllr Anthony Okereke (Leader for the Royal Borough of Greenwich) and Cllr Averil Lekau (Deputy Leader of the Royal Borough of Greenwich) met with Rokhsana Fiaz (Mayor of the London Borough of Newham) Abena Oppong-Asare (MP for Erith and Thamesmead) Seb Dance (Deputy Mayor of London for Transport) and John Lewis (Peabody's Executive Director for Thamesmead) to discuss better transport links for the town. They are pictured above at Thamesmead Town Centre.

Peabody outlined its vision for Thamesmead Waterfront. Transforming the 100-hectare site with up to 15,000 new homes, 55 hectares of open space, shops, schools, leisure, and cultural facilities.

Cllr Anthony Okereke said: "The Royal Borough of Greenwich and the London Borough of Newham share many of the same objectives. I look forward to collaborating with our partners to bring forward essential transport links to an area that has so much potential to offer."

Abena Oppong-Asare, MP, added: "For too long Thamesmead has been left off the transport map. Extending the DLR to Thamesmead would unlock significant new housing on both sides of the river and would open up access to work and educational opportunities for my constituents."

Seb Dance, said: "A DLR extension from Gallions Reach in Newham to Beckton Riverside, and across the river to Thamesmead, would be transformative for the area."

Peabody's John Lewis added: "It's important all the different parties dedicated to the advancement of Thamesmead work together to get the town the transport links it deserves. By all coming together like we've done today and presenting a united front we are really increasing the chances of that happening."

The Moorings Sociable Club was even listed in the prestigious Architects' Journal as one of the top 10 buildings to see as part of the entire Festival. If you're interested in exploring Thamesmead's landscape and architecture you don't have to wait until next year's Open House Festival, there are events organised by Peabody throughout the year.



Hundreds of people from across London flocked to Thamesmead this summer as part of this year's Open House Festival – a two-week celebration of the capital's housing, architecture and neighbourhoods.

The themes of the walking tours in Thamesmead were: 'Thamesmead's Lost Landscapes', 'Thamesmead Beyond Brutalism' and 'Town of Tomorrow' - all led by Peabody team members.

Fix my street

Peabody has launched a new online service so residents can easily report any problems on their streets and open spaces such as fly-tipping, pest control and faulty public lighting.

Using FixMyStreet residents can now photograph, locate, and highlight an issue using their mobile phone. All reports go to Peabody's Environmental Services team in Thamesmead, who will log the job and confirm when the problem has been resolved.


It's all part of Peabody's plan to improve the day-to-day experiences of residents and ensure Thamesmead is a place that people are proud to call home.

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Fund steam ahead

Crossness pumping station, known as "The Cathedral on the Marsh", was originally built in 1865 to help resolve the sewage problem that existed across London in the 1800's.

Visitors can witness the stunning monument to Victorian architecture and be amazed by the sheer magnitude of the largest rotative beam engines in the world.

On Open Days the Royal Arsenal Narrow Gauge (RANG) Railway, based at the Crossness Engines site Abbey Wood (www.crossness.org.uk), transports visitors to the historic pumping station and returns them to the main entrance at the end of their visit.

The train ride has been described as a "little gem" with many compliments from passengers and their amazement that a railway exists on their doorstep, right beside the River Thames.

Unfortunately, RANG Railway has been out of action lately and is presently running a crowd funding campaign to raise money to repair the locomotive "Bazalgette", named after Sir Joseph Bazalgette, the engineer responsible for building the original London sewer system.

Black Culture Collective



Three winning projects have been announced by **Thamesmead's Black Culture** Collective programme.

Peabody supported local residents to launch the collective in 2020, recognising the critical role Thamesmead's black community has played in shaping the cultural, social and economic life of the town throughout its history.

As part of the programme, every year the Collective select and support community and cultural projects that reflect its aims and ambitions. This year's chosen commissions are:

Made in Thamesmead – an animated documentary directed by Mary Martins; a documentary animator, researcher and artist filmmaker who has lived in Thamesmead since 2016.

Made in Thamesmead will combine live action footage with 2D animation to explore the history, migration and settlement of the Black African and Caribbean community in Thamesmead.

Local residents will have an opportunity to participate in the creation of the animation through a series of workshops. Once complete, the documentary will be screened nationally

in early 2023, before being stored in the Thamesmead Community Archive where it will be made available for the public to view.

Black History RE: Creative - a comprehensive programme for young people aged three to 18 which aims to educate those from all backgrounds about Black history. Created by Tatiana Oriana, Director of The R.O.M.E.L Foundation.

This series of workshops will present factual information on Black history not taught in schools, using various art forms including crafts, drama, dance, singing, music, photography, food, hair styling, creative writing and film.

LPF Kiddies Club: Access to Art – offers children aged nine to 14 the opportunity to learn about, celebrate and explore African and Caribbean arts, culture and history. Developed by Carmel Britto, Education Director at LPF Kiddies Club.

Access to Art aims to introduce children to African and Caribbean artists, art forms, histories and cultures. They'll get to immerse themselves in a variety of learning experiences, as well as create their own art pieces, participate in performances, and go on day trips to visit exhibitions and places of interest outside of their local area.

The Black Culture Collective panel said: "We all want to see more activities created and delivered by Black people locally which is why we're so pleased with the quality of projects we're supporting this year. We need to leave the next generation of people of African and Caribbean heritage with a legacy of belonging in Thamesmead. These projects will help us reach that goal."

Adriana Marques, Head of Thamesmead Cultural Strategy at Peabody, said: "This year's Black Culture Collective commission is supporting yet another brilliant set of activities that celebrate and uplift Black culture in Thamesmead. We hope they will help to give local people a better sense of their history and provide much-needed opportunities for people to celebrate their heritage."

The Black Culture Collective forms part of Peabody's wider cultural programme in Thamesmead, which aims to offer people things to do and places to go all year round. Sarah-Jane makes your day



To many residents Sarah-Jane Day is the face of Peabody in Thamesmead. Whether it's been at Park View Hub, the Marketing Suite near Abbey Wood station or now at The Nest at Southmere Lake, if you've popped in to ask a question or catch up on what Peabody is doing - there's a good chance it will have been Sarah-Jane you'll have spoken to.

Sarah-Jane first joined Peabody in 2012 working as a Neighbourhood Manager for homes in central London before moving to her current role as Information and Engagement Manager in Thamesmead four years ago.

Sarah-Jane says: "I'd worked in Housing since I was 23 and wanted to do something different and more positive rather than staying in an enforcement role.

"It was obvious there was going to be a lot going on in Thamesmead and I thought it would be really interesting to go on that journey watching an entire town change and develop over a number of years."

In her role, Sarah-Jane works with Peabody colleagues to make sure local voices are heard. This can involve partnering with local groups, such as the Community Design Collective and Creating Pavements Team, to deliver the projects.

"Obviously any change in a community brings concerns and questions from residents, so it was important that Peabody had a plan in place and somewhere people could come and ask about what we were doing and how they can become involved.

"You can have all the information online or in leaflets that residents can take away but there's always going to be those who prefer to meet face-to-face and talk things through.

"Over the past four years the way Peabody works with the community has really developed and now projects are often done in partnership between us and local groups or individual residents."

Sarah-Jane successfully studied for a Master's degree in Contemporary History and Politics while she's been at Peabody and is now using that passion for local heritage to become a fully qualified tour guide by completing a training course run by the Open City scheme.

"It's impossible to work in Thamesmead without becoming fascinated with the town's history and architecture and I wanted to learn how I could share that interest with other people.

"The course has taught me how to create a tour, conduct risk assessments, everything you need to know to carry out successful tours.

"This summer, I ran a tour in Thamesmead called "Beyond Brutalism" as part of this year's Open City programme. I was a bit nervous at first but more than 30 people turned up and I really enjoyed it and I think they did too.

"It was such a treat to show places like Abbey Wood, the Moorings Sociable Club, the original 1960s buildings and Thamesmead's great green and blue spaces with people who hadn't been here before."

But it's not just spreading the word of Thamesmead to visitors that excites Sarah-Jane about her role at Peabody, it's her dayto-day interaction with residents and hearing what they think that gets her out of bed in the morning.

"Feedback from residents is so important, the conversations I have had with local people over the years is always passed on and has a real influence on the future plans for the town," Sarah-Jane says.

Getting out and about is great for our health and wellbeing, which is why Peabody wants to encourage as many people as possible to walk, wheel and cycle around Thamesmead.

The ten local residents were appointed in September last year to be part of the new Community Working Group and will continue to work with Sustrans and Peabody until January 2023 to develop a design for a safe, attractive and wildlife-friendly pathway.

The team, which is made up of ten local residents, Peabody and Sustrans (a walking, wheeling and cycling charity) is looking to create a new route from Southmere Lake to the River Thames - through the old Thamesview Golf Centre.

It's less than a mile to get from one place to the other, but the current routes are not always clearly marked or easy to use - particularly if you have a wheelchair, mobility scooter or a buggy.

As part of the 'Pathways to the Thames' project, the team spoke to local residents over the summer to learn more about who travels through and visits the former golf course, including what people love about it and want to keep.

The team also explored why some people don't go there and what would make it a place where more residents want to spend time in and walk through.

The 'Pathways to the Thames' project is being funded by Peabody and the Greater London Authority (GLA).

Come to Tump 53

There's been more than 10,000 visitors to the Tump 53 Nature Reserve since Peabody reopened the nature reserve in 2019.

Visitors can take part in sessions about woodland habitat, pond dipping, shelter building, fire lighting and team buildingactivies which help young people to connect and learn about nature.

These activities give young people an opportunity to practice important life skills like communication, leadership, risk taking and promote self-worth and increasing self-esteem.

Rare bee spotted



One of the rarest and most threatened bees in the UK was sighted in Thamesmead this summer.

The Shrill carder bee, usually only found in a handful of places in Southern England and South Wales, was seen in Southmere Park by CLEVER Cities consultants RSK Wilding, while delivering Pollinator Workshops as part of the Making Space for Nature summer programme.

RSK Wilding included the sighting in their biodiversity report for the project and Peabody's Landscape Activation Manager, Jack Gower, informed the Bumblebee Conservation Trust.

Bex Cartwright, Senior Conservation Officer at the Bumblebee Conservation Trust, said: "This is really brilliant news. The habitat creation and management is working and Shrill carder bees are responding. I'm delighted for everyone working on this biodiversity enhancement project and for the bee."

Even though Autumn is here there's still lots to be done in Thamesmead's many green spaces.



Making a splash

More than 200 people took part in two outdoor swimming days held at Birchmere Lake, following suggestions from residents.

Peabody partnered with experts PTP Coaching Ltd, who supervised the swimming, with local organisations and groups asking swimmers and park users how they felt about the activity and what else they'd like to see locally.

118 people responded and the Making Space for Nature team is now analysing the overwhelmingly positive and encouraging feedback with a view to making outdoor swimming a regular activity in Thamesmead next year.

Energy prices have been rising over the past few months, so it's not surprising many of us are thinking twice about putting on the heating this winter.

However, even though it makes sense to worry about rising costs, it's also important to make sure the way you heat your home is safe. Using paraffin, kerosene or calor gas in portable gas heaters is extremely dangerous. They give off carbon monoxide, which can risk your life and your neighbours' lives.

They pose a higher risk of fire or explosion and make carbon dioxide, nitrogen dioxide, and sulphur dioxide, which are also harmful to the environment. Inhaling these fumes is dangerous, especially for pregnant women, young children, and people with asthma or heart disease.

Electric heaters and oil-filled radiators are safer and tend to be cheaper to run. You can put them in the rooms you use instead of heating the whole house.

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Getting ready for a career



This summer young people in Thamesmead enjoyed some great work experience opportunities thanks to the Peabody Young People Team.

Work experience has been high on the agenda in Thamesmead after an influx of requests were made from students and local schools.

The pandemic has seen many young people missing this particularly important aspect of their learning journey, so the Thamesmead team worked hard to help bridge the gap.

Within Peabody we placed six young people from Thamesmead in some of our offices, including Westminster Bridge Road and The Moorings Sociable Club and through our partnerships we helped to facilitate a variety of work experience opportunities for local young people. These included a group of St Paul's Academy students working with Volunteer It Yourself on a live building site, an Architecture Internship at Karakusevic Carson Architects for a Harris Garrard student and paid opportunities for various local young people with the Greenwich+Docklands International Festival (GDIF).

Year 10 St Paul's Academy Student Joseph, who spent a few days at Charlton Rugby Football Club working to improve the bar area and build some benches, said: "I have built my confidence using tools, the people here really supported us".

A-level Student Andy Mon completed a four-week paid internship with Karakusevic Carson Architects and said "My experience at KCA has been fantastic, it has opened my eyes to the world of Architecture. Being in the office has contributed hugely to improving my skills and I am so grateful to have been given this opportunity. Having real life experience of the working world is really important".

Our partnership with Career Ready allowed 33 young people from local schools to access a 1-2-1 mentor from professionals in various industries such as BP, Network Rail, AstraZeneca and of course Peabody and 19 young people were placed into one month paid internships with various organisations.

Peabody is supporting Career Ready again this year in both **Woolwich Polytechnic school for boys** and Harris Garrard Academy for year 12 students. Please apply in your school for this opportunity.

The Javan Coker Foundation is being supported by Peabody's **Thamesmead Community Fund to deliver the SEND** (Special Educational Needs and Disabilities) Siblings Care programme for young people between the ages of 10 and 16 years-old.

24 young people, with SEND siblings, took part in a six-week programme centred around workshops, group talks and culminating in a trip to Jimmy's restaurant at the O2. The young people made friends and increased their confidence, as well as improving their communication and social skills.

Uduak Jesuthasan, Peabody's Children, Families & Young People lead in Thamesmead, said: "Siblings of children with SEND often find

themselves playing the role of carer even when they are younger in age. Giving these siblings a time of respite is great for increasing their confidence, self-esteem and reducing loneliness".


